MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Often supporters tell me, “I feel so helpless when I read these stories” or ask “Is there anything we can do apart from praying? Can we get money to them?” These are natural expressions of a desire to help brothers and sisters in a desperate situation. Sometimes there isn't anything we can do and that can be frustrating but sometimes there are ways to make a difference.



One of our main aims – alongside raising awareness, encouraging prayer and advocating for justice – is supporting victims of persecution. In some countries it involves supporting families of Christian prisoners; in others, it's channelling aid to churches and Christian communities that have suffered violent attack. Another major part of our aid programme is supplying Bibles and Christian literature to countries where such resources are restricted.

In the following pages you'll read about how we're making a difference in China, Eritrea, India, Iran, Nigeria, North Korea, Pakistan and Uganda through our network of overseas partners organisations, many of them headed up by natural Christians with direct experience of persecution in their home country.

**CHINESE CHILDREN'S BIBLES
BEING PRINTED** (*China Aid*)

President Xi Jinping's sinicisation policy has increased control of official churches through strict new regulations and has increased persecution of unregistered churches, with many church leaders in prison.

How does aid help Chinese Christians?

For security reasons it's not possible to give exact details about the recipients of aid. Among the projects Church in Chains has supported recently are: supporting a church under sustained severe harassment and oppression from the Chinese authorities; providing legal aid to imprisoned pastors facing criminal charges; and providing for families of Christians in prison and some persecuted former prisoners.

We are involved in supplying Bibles and Christian literature, including supplying digital Bible resources loaded on micro SD cards. The latest project funded has been a €5,000 grant to print and distribute children's Bibles (now forbidden in China).

Who are our partners?

Our main partner is **China Aid** which was founded by **Bob Fu** (pictured), a former Christian prisoner in China, who is a regular visitor to Ireland and has spoken at several Church in Chains events.

We also partner with **Chinese Church Support Ministries**, which works to resource and equip the Chinese church with Bibles and Christian teaching materials.



Pray for wisdom and creativity for China Aid and Chinese Church Support Ministries as they seek to respond to the many needs presented to them.

AID TO ERITREA



President Isaias Afewerki has governed Eritrea since 1993 and severely represses anyone perceived to be a threat to the government, including Christians. All churches except the Eritrean Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Lutheran churches are banned and hundreds of Christians have been imprisoned indefinitely, including those pictured.

How does aid help Eritrean Christians?

Church in Chains works with its partner to support the families of Christian prisoners. Released prisoners in need also receive medicine, food and short-term accommodation. Some aid is used to help them to set up small business enterprises.

Aid is also given to some former prisoners who have left the country and live in refugee camps, where they receive financial support and also discipleship training.

Who are Church in Chains' partners?

Our partner is **Release Eritrea**, set up by Eritrean Christians living outside the country who are dedicated to standing with the persecuted church in Eritrea and seeking to meet the needs of those who suffer for their faith.

Release Eritrea is led by **Dr Berhane Asmelash** (pictured), a former prisoner in Eritrea, who spoke at the Church in Chains conference in Dublin in 2023. He has extensive contacts and personally knows many of the long-term prisoners pictured above.



Pray for wisdom for Release Eritrea as it seeks to use funds wisely to meet the most pressing needs of Eritrean Christians.



**CHURCH DESTROYED IN ODISHA STATE
IN NOVEMBER 2025** (*Persecution Relief*)

Persecution of Christians by Hindu militants mainly occurs in villages and rural areas. Militants assault worshippers, disrupt prayer meetings, vandalise church buildings and pressure police to arrest Christians under anti-conversion laws.

How does aid help Indian Christians?

The rise in persecution has led to many pastors being arrested and held for several months before being able to secure bail, leaving their families without any income. Church in Chains has supported many pastors' families and we also give aid to support victims of violent attacks with medical and hospital expenses and to Christians who are forced out of their homes and villages.

We have also contributed to Paran (a refuge centre for Christians in need of safety, rest, counselling and guidance after suffering persecution) which is currently undergoing its final fitting out.

Who are Church in Chains' partners?

Our main partner is **Persecution Relief** which was founded by **Shibu Thomas** (pictured), an Indian businessman, in response to God's call. Shibu has visited Ireland twice including speaking at our recent Supporters Day. Persecution Relief has a prayer network covering every district in India and provides immediate practical relief following appeals for help from all over the country.



Pray for God's blessing and strength for Shibu Thomas and his colleagues at Persecution Relief as they support those who have suffered injury or loss.



Most Christians in Iran are converts from Islam and face persecution for meeting together to read the Bible and worship or for sharing their faith with others. They are often arrested in raids on homes or house church meetings and charged with “threatening national security” and “actions against the regime”.

How does aid help Iranian Christians?

Church in Chains works with several partners in the Iran region to provide support to Christian prisoners, their families, ex-prisoners and Iranian Christians forced to flee the country. Sometimes aid may be needed to pay for medical treatment or living expenses for those who are destitute because of persecution.

Separately, we also provide support for the printing and distribution of Iranian New Testaments and discipleship programmes for church leaders in Iran.

Who are Church in Chains’ partners?

We work with two main partners in the Iran region. Aid for material support for prisoners is channelled through **Article 18**, led by **Mansour Borji** (pictured), an Iranian convert who spoke at the Church in Chains conference in Dublin in 2022.

Aid to support provision of Bibles and discipleship programmes is channelled through **Elam Ministries**.



Pray for great wisdom and protection for Article 18 and Elam Ministries as they serve the church in Iran in their respective roles in a challenging environment.

AID BEING DISTRIBUTED TO DISPLACED CHRISTIANS IN PLATEAU STATE IN APRIL 2025 (Stefanos Foundation)



Over 3,000 Christians were killed in Nigeria last year (most in the north and Middle Belt regions). Attacks in the north are carried out by Islamist terrorist groups Boko Haram and ISWAP, and in the Middle Belt by militant Fulani herdsmen using heavy weapons to drive largely Christian farmers off fertile grazing land.

How does aid help Nigerian Christians?

Church in Chains works with its partner to provide emergency aid to displaced Christian communities following attacks – typically this involves supplying food aid buckets to families and sometimes blankets. We have also supported rebuilding and re-roofing projects so Christians can return home after attacks. Another area of support focuses on the delivery of trauma counselling to address the psychological trauma experienced by children following violent attack. Church in Chains has also supported the refurbishing of a convert care centre for Christian converts from Islam.

Who are Church in Chains' partners?

Our main partner is **Stefanos Foundation**, set up by the Christian Association of Nigeria and dedicated to making the voice of the persecuted Church heard as well as giving practical care and support in the most desperate situations. Stefanos is led by **Mark Lipdo** (pictured) who spoke at the Church in Chains conference in Dublin in 2024.



Pray for provision and protection for Stefanos staff who are constantly travelling and working in dangerous situations.



STILL FROM A SHORT FILM ABOUT NORTH KOREAN CHRISTIANS (*Voice of the Martyrs Korea*)

Kim Jong-Un, the Supreme Leader of North Korea since 2011, has continued the harsh religious repression practised by his father and grandfather. North Korean Christians today can only meet in small family groups at home in extreme secrecy. An estimated 30,000 Christians are in labour camps.

How does aid help North Korean Christians?

Church in Chains works with its partner to support the North Korean underground church by providing Bibles and four radio broadcasts per day into North Korea. It also provides discipleship training for North Korean Christian defectors through its "Underground University" programme.

Further details cannot be shared for security reasons but our partner states, *"We look for every possible way to bring the word of God to North Korea, with respect for law and in cooperation with local communities."*

Who are Church in Chains' partners?

Our main partner is **Voice of the Martyrs Korea** which is led by **Rev Dr Eric Foley** (pictured) who co-founded the mission with his wife, **Rev Dr Hyun Sook Foley**.

Eric spoke at the Church in Chains online conference in 2021. From its foundation, Voice of the Martyrs Korea has prioritised working with North Korean Christians to develop its ministry.

Aid to Pakistan

Christians experience social hostility and widespread discrimination in Pakistan. The controversial blasphemy laws are often misused to settle personal scores and many innocent Christians spend years in prison awaiting trial or appeal. Another major issue is the kidnapping and forced conversion and marriage of Christian girls and women to married Muslim men.

How does aid help Pakistani Christians?

Church in Chains works with its partners to support Christians accused under the blasphemy laws and their families, abducted Christian girls and their families and other Christians who face oppression or discrimination of various types. Aid has also been sent to Christians excluded from flood relief programmes.

Who are Church in Chains' partners?

Church in Chains has several partners in Pakistan. **CLAAS/Edge Foundation** provides legal support for Christians accused under the blasphemy laws and channels aid to their families. It also supports the families of abducted Christian girls.

Caring For God's People arranges care for some prisoners and also supports a Christian school and a Christian women's ministry. **Christians' True Spirit** founded by **Katherine Sapna** (pictured) runs a shelter home caring for abducted Christian girls who've been rescued. They receive food, accommodation, psychological support and assistance in starting a new life.



Pray for provision and protection for CLAAS, Caring for God's People and Christians' True Spirit in their distinctive ministries aiding Pakistani Christians.

AID TO UGANDA

CHRISTIAN FAMILIES BEING SHELTERED AFTER THREATS AGAINST THEM

(Tower of Prayer Revival Ministry)



Uganda is over 80% Christian and most Christians can practise their faith freely. However, in Muslim-majority areas in eastern Uganda there has been a huge increase in violent attacks on Christians (particularly converts from Islam) in recent years.

How does aid help Ugandan Christians?

After careful research to identify suitable partners, Church in Chains started its first aid project in summer 2025. The first project is supporting seventeen families who have had to flee their homes due to persecution. Some have been assisted with financial support for accommodation in new areas while four families are living in a designated safe house.

The families are being supported with food packages and assistance with medication and school fees have been paid for fourteen children from these families. Discipleship programmes have been provided for those who are converts from a Muslim background.

Who are Church in Chains' partners?

Church in Chains' partners in Uganda are **Tower of Prayer Revival Ministry International** led by **Pastor Emmanuel Mwondha** (pictured) and **True Spiritual Sound Ministry** which both operate in eastern Uganda. Both partners are engaged in Christian ministry and evangelism and have recently begun projects to aid persecuted Christians, having become aware of this growing need in the course of their ministries.



Pray for wisdom and protection for Tower of Prayer Revival Ministry International and True Spiritual Sound Ministry as they support persecuted Christians in Uganda.

TWO LONG-TERM PRISONERS RELEASED



In mid November **Zhang Shaojie** of Nanle County Christian Church in Henan province was released at the end of his twelve-year sentence. He was imprisoned after a dispute with local officials who were trying to seize church land. After release, he was reunited with his 84-year-old mother. Pastor Zhang said, *"I have seen the Holy Spirit's presence every day. I am deeply grateful for help and support of the international community; otherwise, I might not be here today and might have been 'disappeared'."*

Earlier in November **Pastor Xing Wenxiang** of Holy Love Christian Church in Jinhua, Zhejiang province, was released from prison after a two-year reduction in her twelve-year sentence. Our partner China Aid stated, *"These ten years in prison inflicted significant physical and mental trauma on her."* In July 2015 Pastor Xing Wenxiang, her husband Pastor Bao Guohua and ten other church workers were arrested after they resisted the campaign to

remove church crosses in Zhejiang province. Bao Guohua was given a fourteen-year sentence and remains in prison with an expected release date of 2029.

OVER THIRTY ZION CHURCH LEADERS DETAINED

On 9 October Chinese authorities launched coordinated raids on churches across the large, unregistered **Zion Church network**, one of the largest unregistered church networks in China, with at least 5,000 members in more than one hundred branches in over forty cities. More than thirty pastors and church staff in at least seven cities were detained, disappeared or placed under house arrest and their homes and worship venues were ransacked, families harassed and property confiscated, including computers and mobile phones.



Some of the detained Christians were released following interrogation but eighteen pastors and staff have been charged with *"illegal dissemination of religious information online"* and placed in criminal detention at Beihai Detention Centre in Guangxi province, including senior pastor and church founder **Jin (Ezra) Mingri**. In a pastoral letter from prison he wrote: *"Don't worry about me. I find great comfort in being able to endure this little suffering for the gospel."* His wife Chunliu Liu lives in the US with their three adult children, who have US citizenship.

SUPREME COURT TO EXAMINE ANTI-CONVERSION LAWS



India's Supreme Court has agreed to hear petitions challenging the constitutionality of anti-conversion laws in various states across the country. Anti-conversion legislation is currently in force in eleven states: **Chhattisgarh, Gujarat, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Odisha, Rajasthan** (the state with the newest anti-conversion laws, passed in September), **Uttarakhand** (which amended its laws in August to make them among the harshest of any state) and **Uttar Pradesh**.

Officially called “Freedom of Religion” laws, they are intended to stop Hindus being converted to other religions and forbid conversion by “force, fraud or allurement” but extremists use them as a licence to attack Christians, claiming they are forcing Hindus to convert. Typically, attackers raid church services, beat those gathered and have pastors arrested on false charges of forcibly converting Hindus.

On 16 September the Supreme Court issued notices to the state governments requesting responses regarding petitions challenging their anti-conversion laws. The governments were given four weeks to respond and the case is currently scheduled to be heard in December.

CHHATTISGARH BANS HOUSE CHURCHES

Police in Raipur, capital of Chhattisgarh state, told a meeting of nearly one hundred local Pentecostal pastors in August that **house churches were to stop functioning until each congregation received permission** from a local government official. Police said they were receiving numerous complaints that illegal conversions were occurring in house churches. No written order was served and Christian activists and pastors describe the verbal demand as an “informal ban”.



Pastors who attended the meeting said police suggested they could merge their house churches with established churches, but Ankush Baryekar, General Secretary of the Chhattisgarh Christian Forum, explained, “Our customs and rituals are very different from other churches” and noted that congregations of established churches have been Christian for generations, whereas Pentecostal congregations come from non-Christian backgrounds.

The closure of house churches comes at great personal cost for pastors, as Ankush Baryekar also explained: “I had a successful career in housekeeping and then in gardening, but I gave it all up to preach daily. I am dependent on my church for a living.”



On 2 October **Zafar Bhatti** was acquitted by the Lahore High Court of blasphemy charges, released from prison and reunited with his wife **Nawab**. Tragically three days later, on 5 October, the 62-year-old pastor suffered a heart attack and died before medical help could reach him.

Zafar had been in Rawalpindi's Adiala Central Jail since July 2012 when he was charged with sending blasphemous text messages. He was held in custody for five years before being convicted in 2017 and sentenced to life imprisonment. In 2022, the sentence was upgraded to a death sentence. At least 47 appeal hearings between 2017 and 2025 were adjourned by judges for a wide variety of reasons and in recent years several recommendations by prison authorities for his release on bail on medical grounds were ignored.

Zafar's acquittal following a hearing on 25 September when his lawyer Saiful Malook (who secured the acquittal of Asia Bibi in October 2018) argued that there was no substantive evidence to support his conviction. The judges accepted this reasoning and acquitted Zafar Bhatti of all charges.

People who met Zafar after his release reported that he seemed to be in reasonable health and in good spirits. He had been reunited with his wife Nawab and was looking forward to the future. A medical check-up had been scheduled for him for 6 October, but by then Zafar was dead.

Zafar suffered two minor heart attacks in 2019 and a further heart attack in 2020. In early 2025, the prison doctor stated that he had critical heart disease, his heart function was at only 10%, and that there were no further treatment options available.

Responding to the news of his death, David Turner (Director, Church in Chains) said, *"We are shocked by the news of Zafar's sudden death and are greatly saddened that he and his wife Nawab had such a short time together following his release from prison. We encourage our supporters now to pray for Nawab who had waited so long for his release and whose joy has so suddenly turned to grief."*

“SERVING THE PERSECUTED; LOVING THE PERSECUTORS”

On Saturday 27 September our annual Supporters Day took place in Trinity Church in Dublin City Centre. We started the day with worship led by members from Bethel Sanctuary International Church and prayer.



Shibu Thomas, founder of our Indian partner organisation Persecution Relief, then gave the keynote speech. He explained: *“India has never faced a situation like this in the last 78 years of Indian independence. This is the time where maximum number of Christians are in the jails.”* In thirteen Indian states anti-conversion laws have led to increased violence against Christians including disruption of church services, beatings and imprisonment of pastors and burning of homes and church buildings.

Shibu shared a number of powerful testimonies of persecuted Indian Christians, telling delegates about pastors sharing their faith with other inmates in prison and attackers who came to faith after their Christian victims forgave them. Shibu emphasised the importance of loving and praying for persecutors: *“We can't go and hate them... because God said pray for them, God said love them unconditionally. So that's why the motto that the Lord has given me for Persecution Relief is 'serving persecuted and loving persecutors'.”*

Shibu concluded his talk by asking us to keep praying for his country and encouraged us that while persecution is increasing, the church is growing and becoming more unified: *“Continue praying for India. Continue praying for the prime minister. There is great unity among the church because people are fearful because of the persecution that is happening. So everybody needs everybody. So there is a great bonding happening. People are coming together. The denominational barriers are breaking and people are coming together and standing together for the kingdom of God.”*

In the following Q&A session Shibu dealt with questions from whether there has been any success in challenging the anti-conversion laws in the courts of India to how Christians meet if their church buildings are closed.



After a break for lunch and Indian snacks there was more worship and also time to visit five prayer rooms and pray for persecuted Christians in China, Eritrea, India, Iran and Nigeria.

As always it was lovely to catch up with supporters who attended in person and great to see that many watched the livestream and the recording on YouTube.



MEETING IRISH CHRISTIANS AT KINFIRE

In August, **Susanne Chipperfield** and **David Turner** travelled to Kilkenny College to be part of the **Kinfire** Festival – now in its third year of gathering Christians from across the island for a time of worship, teaching, reflection, fellowship and fun for all the family.



Church in Chains had a “pop-up” stand for one day at the Festival and we were delighted to meet and chat with supporters and to explain our work to those who we met at the stand. Church in Chains provided a branded air freshener to be included in the welcome pack received by the more than 400 people who attended Kinfire.

Church in Chains also worked with Open Doors on a special “Secret Church” late-night event on the campus of the college. In a “Behind Bars” section of the event, David Turner performed a dramatised telling of the story of Zafar Bhatti.



INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER



Thank you to all the churches across Ireland that participated in this year's International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP) in November. We were delighted to supply prayer resources to **32 churches around Ireland** – in counties **Antrim, Armagh, Cavan, Cork, Dublin, Galway, Kilkenny, Mayo, Tipperary, Westmeath, and Wicklow.**

The focus of IDOP in Ireland this year was on India and many churches showed a three-minute video featuring our Indian partner Shibu Thomas (Persecution Relief) and used prayer points which were printed on a prayer card made available to all present in the various churches.

THANK YOU CORCAGHAN

In early October, the 21st annual Corcaghan Gospel Concert for the Persecuted Church was held as usual in the Corcaghan Community Centre in Co. Monaghan.

It was another great evening of Country Gospel music introduced in his usual warm style by the inimitable **Walter Pringle**. **Grace McClintock** sang at Corcaghan for the first time joining regular performers **Gordon Quinn** and **Parker Donnelly**. The **Ballybay Country Gospel Group** anchored the evening leading congregational singing as well as performing their own songs.



David Turner (Church in Chains) made a presentation about this year's chosen project, "A Safe Haven", for Christian women in Pakistan (in conjunction with our partner Caring For God's People) and there was, once again, a marvellous and generous response from the audience. The overall total raised by the concert this year was €6,421.

Held every year since 2005, the Corcaghan concerts have raised over €100,000 for overseas projects and the money has been used to provide aid for prisoners' families in Eritrea, India and Pakistan, Bibles for China, North Korea and Iran and to re-roof houses for Christians in Nigeria amongst other projects.

Behind the success of Corcaghan is a dedicated and totally committed team of hard-working volunteers who make the event run like clockwork including providing supper for the audience. ENCOURAGE A CHRISTIAN

When you are writing Christmas cards to family and friends this year, please consider sending a card to a Christian prisoner of faith in China or Pakistan.

Pastor Yang Rongli of Linfen Golden Lampstand Church and her husband Pastor Wang Xiaoguang have been in prison since August 2021. She is serving a 15-year sentence.

Pastor Wang Yi of Early Rain Covenant Church has been in prison since December 2018. He is serving a nine-year prison sentence.

Ashfaq Masih has been in prison in Pakistan since 2017, when he was accused of blasphemy. He is waiting for an appeal to be heard against the death sentence imposed in July 2022.

What do I need to remember when writing my card?

Keep to a simple Christmas greeting as the content of your card will have to be translated.

DON'T make any criticism of the government

DON'T mention Church in Chains

DON'T refer to their arrest or sentence

DON'T include your address
